3. What groups are involved?	4. What non-human things are involved? How did people get information? How did they travel?
5. What are the expectations for different groups of people? How are they expected to act or speak?	6. What else is going on that might be important?

Temporal Elements	Spatial Elements
e.g.; historical, seasonal, crisis, and/or trajectory aspects	e.g.; spaces in the situation; geographical aspects; local, regional, national, global issues
Major Issues/ Debates (Usually Contested)	Related Discourses (historical, Narrative and/or Visual)
As found in the situation; and see positional map	e.g.; normative expectations of actors, actants, and/or other specified elements; moral/ethical elements; mass media and other popular cultural discourses; situation-specific discourses
